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# Senate candidate and former refugee stops in Fort Benton to share his story

By Bethany Monroe DeBorde Wilmot Collins arrived in the United States in 1994 with just 25 cents to his name, ready to reunite with his family in their new hometown: Helena, Montana.

Today, the former Liberian refugee is serving as Montana's first black mayor, elected in 2017 to

lead the city of Helena. Last month, he announced his candidacy for the 2020 U.S. Senate race, running as a Democrat against Republican incumbent Steve Daines.

Collins visited Fort Benton on Sunday evening to attend the Chouteau County Democratic Central Committee meeting, where he shared his story with more than 30 people gathered at the Memorial Ambulance of Fort Benton.

"This is the largest group of emocrats that we've had together in Chouteau County in 50 years," said Gar Wood of Loma, who coordinated the meeting along with Casey Bailey of Fort Benton.

Along with Collins, the group also welcomed guest speaker Ron De Yong, former director of the Montana Department of Agriculture.

Collins opened his talk with a brief history lesson on his native country of Liberia, a West African nation populated by former American slaves in the mid-1800s. The former slaves brought the **English language and Christianity** with them, and both became the norm in their new home country. Liberia's capital is Monrovia, named for former U.S. President James Monroe.

Liberia was the first African nation to gain independence, all the way back in 1847, and for many decades it was a model country for the continent, Collins said.

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

The Memorial Ambulance of instruction. Fort Benton received a "classroom in a box," including the technology to view Best Practice Medicine's Bozeman-based EMT classes live from the ambulance barn's meeting room. The training is a mix of virtual classes and handson labs. Fort Benton's veteran EMTs help lead the class, with Deichman visiting a few times over the next couple months to provide

Over the course of the 10week program, the students will clock 160 hours in class time and assignments. They meet a couple evenings a week, plus Saturdays.

Saturday's hands-on lab included learning to ventilate a patient by practicing on a pig's lungs. Students also examined a pig's heart.

The 13 students include 11 from Chouteau County and two who commute from Havre. Five members of law enforcement - Seth Broesder, Riley McDermott, Erica Stanley and Aaron Conner from the Fort Benton Police Department, plus Deputy Adam Jacques from the Chouteau County Sheriff's Office, are all taking the class. Two spouses of law enforcement officers are also enrolled.

**Best Practice Medicine runs four** EMT classes each year and is happy to work with rural communities needing their services, Deichman said.

Fort Benton Police Chief Seth Broesder said their participation in the class stemmed from a conversation with Nancy Lachapelle from the Chouteau County Health Department. She asked if he had any ideas for Fort might be put to good use.


The volunteer EMTs have to drop what they're doing and drive to the ambulance barn when an emergency call comes in, so the police officer on duty is typically the first to arrive on a scene. Broesder noted it would be helpful if the officers each had basic lifesaving training and equipment.

The grant is part of the Opioid Prevention Project, a Data-Driven Prevention Initiative sponsored by the Department of Health and Human Services, Lachapelle said. The funds will pay for the officers' training, plus some of the equipment they will need to carry in their patrol cars.

"The goal is that all four of us will end up licensed EMTs and it's up to my officers on an individual basis if they want to volunteer with the ambulance service," Broesder

Either way, they will carry bag valve masks and other emergency aid gear in their patrol cars and will be trained in how to respond. The officers had previously been trained to carry oxygen tanks and Narcan, a drug used to counteract an opioid overdose.

Officer Aaron Conner's past CPR training helped him save a man's approached him about grant life just a few weeks ago, Broesder funding that was available for said. There's no telling when their opioid overdose prevention and new emergency response training
